## Introduction

1. School Vision, Mission Statement, Educational Philosophy, and Sponsor Information
A. Vision

Within a decade of opening its doors, Nova Classical Academy will be recognized in Minnesota as providing a high quality K-12 classical education in the western tradition. Nova will continue to be led by a strong parent-led board and skilled school management. The faculty and parents will fully support and practice the principles of classical education. Nova will reside on a campus that fully supports the K-12 program while maintaining its small school environment. The school will graduate a class of seniors who embody Nova's educational aim. The school's faculty will be highly qualified to teach the classical model and the school's financial stability will support the growing needs of a reputable classical education in the public domain.
B. Profile

Nova Classical Academy was started by three parents who wanted a more rigorous education for their children. The school they founded was the first public school in Minnesota to offer a classical education where the students would not only learn subjects, but moral character as well. Most importantly, Nova was created to be a school where students are taught how to think and how to apply their knowledge in different situations.
C. Mission Statement

In a nurturing, small-school environment, and through the use of an academically accelerated and enriched curriculum, Nova Classical Academy will offer its learners a rigorous, thorough, systematic, challenging, K-12 college-preparatory education in the classical tradition.

## 2. Student Background/ Demographics

## A. Number of Students Enrolled

Nova began in the fall of 2003 with 166 students enrolled in kindergarten through $6^{\text {th }}$ grade, with two sections of kindergarten and one section each in $1^{\text {st }}$ through $6^{\text {th }}$. By the 2009-2010 school year, Nova had 571 students in kindergarten through $9^{\text {th }}$ grade and had three sections K-3 as well as two sections of every other grade. Even with the expansion in sections, Nova continues to have a long waiting list (500+ students), especially in kindergarten through $8^{\text {th }}$ grade.

For 2009-10, the Executive Director, Brian Bloomfield, had goals approved by the Board of Directors at the August 2009 board meeting. Those goals include specific accomplishments within the general areas of student assessment, human resource and personnel management, financial management; legal and compliance management, effective communication, and board, authorizer, and community relationships. The Executive Director's Professional Development Plan for 2009-10 was two-fold:

1) to work towards obtaining valid MN administrator licensure by June 2010
2) to report to the Board three times on progress towards goals agreed upon in the August 2009 board meeting: once in December 2009, once in March 2010, and once in June 2010.

For 2010-11, Mr Bloomfield has earned his K-12 licensure in Minnesota (May 2010). He has goals reviewed by the Board of Directors at the September 2010 meeting.

## 6. School Finances

In 2009-10 Nova continued to implement best practices in our financial systems and control mechanisms. Nova ended 2009 with a $12.6 \%$ fund balance and had set a goal for 2010 of having at least a $15 \%$ fund balance. Nova had also set a goal of winning the MN Finance Award for the 2009-10 school year as well as having a clean (no findings) external audit. In November 2009 Nova Classical Academy received back its external audit (performed by MMKR) with no findings (material or otherwise). In December 2009 Nova Classical Academy won its first-ever MN Finance Award. Nova's projected fund balance at the end of SY2010 is 22.7\%.

## 7. Accountability Data: Review of Testing Program

Nova Classical Academy administers the MCA-II to all students in grades 3-8 to measure math and reading proficiency relative to Minnesota State Academic Standards over time.

## 8. Program Successes and Best Practices

## A. Enrollment

Enrollment increased $41.3 \%$ from 404 in 2008-09 to 571 in 2009-10 through the introduction of a third section of grades K-3, increasing class sizes to a base of 26 in grades $3+$, as well as opening the high school with a ninth grade class. Enrollment continues to increase at Nova Classical Academy.

## B. Parent Involvement/ Satisfaction

Nova's Accountability Committee administered a Parent Satisfaction Survey to the entire community in the Spring of 2010. Overall satisfaction with Nova averaged 4.44 on a 5 -point scale ( 5 being extremely satisfied), slightly up from the previous year's average of 4.19, with 132 people (out of 138) giving a rating for their overall satisfaction.
