# 1. School Vision, Mission Statement, Educational Philosophy, and Sponsor Information

#### A. Vision

Classical education at Nova will allow us to graduate a young adult who is a rational thinker, self-motivated learner, and demonstrates him/herself to be a person of character.

#### B. Profile

Nova Classical Academy was started by three parents who wanted a more rigorous education for their children. The school they founded was the first public school in Minnesota to offer a classical education where the students would not only learn subjects, but moral character as well. Most importantly, Nova was created to be a school where students are taught how to think and how to apply their knowledge in different situations.

#### C. Mission Statement

In a nurturing, small-school environment, and through the use of an academically accelerated and enriched curriculum, Nova Classical Academy will offer its learners a rigorous, thorough, systematic, challenging, K-12 college-preparatory education in the classical tradition.

#### **D.** Educational Philosophy

Nova Classical Academy seeks to form young adults who possess the moral virtues (Prudence, Justice, Fortitude, and Temperance) and the intellectual virtues (Wisdom, Understanding, and Science) as articulated in the western tradition in order that they may readily take up the responsibilities of adulthood.

#### 2. Student Background/ Demographics

#### A. Number of Students Enrolled

Nova began in the fall of 2003 with 166 students enrolled in kindergarten through 6<sup>th</sup> grade, with two sections of kindergarten and one section each in 1<sup>st</sup> through 6<sup>th</sup>. By the 2010-2011 school year, Nova had 631 students in kindergarten through 10<sup>th</sup> grade and had three sections K-4, two sections in 5-9, and one section in grade 10. Even with the expansion in sections, Nova continues to have a long waiting list, especially

in kindergarten through  $8^{th}$  grade. The on-time, enrollment wait list began for the 2011-12 school year at 659 children.


#### 6. School Finances

In 2011-12 Nova continued to implement best practices in our financial systems and control mechanisms. Nova ended 2011 with an increase to the fund balance totaling (unaudited) 26.6%. Nova also won the MN Finance Award for the 2010-11 school year (second year in a row) as well as had a clean (no findings) external audit by our new auditors, Larson Allen.

#### 7. Accountability Data: Review of Testing Program


Nova Classical Academy administers the MCAs to all students in grades 3-8 to measure math, reading, and science proficiency relative to Minnesota State Academic Standards over time.

**Figure 7a**Trend in Student Math Proficiency 2006-11 as Measured by MCAs




Math proficiency at Nova Classical Academy exceeds state proficiency averages and has since 2006.

#### 8. Program Successes and Best Practices

#### A. Enrollment

Enrollment increased 11% from 571 in 2009-10 to 631 in 2010-11 through the continued growth of the academy into high school. Enrollment continues to increase at Nova Classical Academy as the program expands to add a third section in grades 5-8 and to admit the 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> grade classes.

#### **B.** Parent Involvement/ Satisfaction

Nova Classical Academy actively encourages the parents of students to volunteer for the school. Families make a commitment to the school for 20 hours of volunteer service each year. Parents volunteer at Nova on a regular basis in a wide variety of activities, including through the very active Nova Parent Teacher Organization ("NPTO"). The NPTO has structures in place to organize the parents' efforts including a Room Parent Program for parents at the lower campus and a Parent Work Group Program at the upper campus. Parent volunteer participation is very high at Nova as opportunities are offered to meet parent interest and availability. Volunteer service is valued and recognized at all levels including participation on the Board of Directors, in the classroom, at school events, and projects that can be done from home. Several school activities are enhanced by the support of parents including the athletic program, the drama productions, and extracurricular clubs such as Math Team, Mock Trial, and Lego Robotics. In the 2010-2011 school year, approximately 10,222 hours of parental volunteer time were contributed to Nova Classical Academy. Of the 293 families at Nova this past year, 236 families (81%) volunteered time for the school and 203 (86%) of these families completed 20 or more hours in the year

#### 9. Academic and Non-Academic Goals for 2010-11

A. Academic Goals for 2010-11

1. **Goal:** Increase the percentage of students who "Exceed Standards" in Reading as measured on the MCA-II to 73%.

Measure: MCA-II results, spring 2011

**Outcome:** Did not meet. 69.6% of Nova's students achieved at the "Exceed Standards" mark for 2011 in reading.

2. **Goal:** Increase the percentage of students who "Exceed Standards" in Math as measured on the MCA-III to 49%.

Measure: MCA results, spring 2011

**Outcome:** Did not meet. 33.5% of Nova's students achieved at the "Exceed Standards" mark for 2011 in mathematics.

#### B. Non Academic Goals for 2010-11

1. **Goal:** Create 3 year funding plan to support securing a permanent facility.

**Measure:** Financial plan approved by Authorizer and Nova Board of Directors.

**Outcome:** Goal met: Nova has completed a successful Review and Comment period with MDE and is working with various financial agencies, community members, and lenders to secure financing to build a permanent facility.

2. **Goal:** Report on success and extension of the Classical Education Certification (CEC) program as a training tool for faculty at Nova and at other classical schools.

Measure: Report submitted to Nova's Board of Directors by June 2011.

**Outcome:** Goal met. The CEC program was installed, reviewed, and reported on, and is in preparation for its second year.
