#### **INTRODUCTION**

#### Vision

Within a decade of opening its doors, Nova Classical Academy will be recognized in Minnesota as providing a high quality K-12 classical education in the western tradition. Nova will continue to be led by a strong parent-led board and skilled school management. The faculty and parents will fully support and practice the principles of classical education. Nova will reside on a campus that fully supports the K-12 program while maintaining its small school environment. The school will graduate a class of seniors who embody Nova's educational aim. The school's faculty will be highly qualified to teach the classical model and the school's financial stability will support the growing needs of a reputable classical education in the public domain.

#### Profile

Nova Classical Academy was started by three parents who wanted a more rigorous education for their children. The school they founded was the first public school in Minnesota to offer a classical education where the students would not only learn subjects, but virtue as well. Most importantly, Nova was created to be a school where students are taught how to think and how to apply their knowledge in different situations.

#### **Mission Statement**

In a nurturing, small-school environment, and through the use of an academically accelerated and enriched curriculum, Nova Classical Academy will offer its learners a rigorous, thorough, systematic, challenging, K-12 college-preparatory education in the classical tradition.

#### Educational Philosophy

Nova Classical Academy seeks to form young adults who possess the moral virtues (Prudence, Justice, Fortitude, and Temperance) and the intellectual virtues (Wisdom, Understanding, and Science) as articulated in the western tradition in order that they may readily take up the responsibilities of adulthood.

## ENROLLMENT

#### Number of Students Enrolled

Nova began in the fall of 2003 with 166 students enrolled in kindergarten through grade 6 grade, with two sections of kindergarten and one section each in grades 1 through 6. By the 2011-2012 school year, Nova had 693 students in Kindergarten through grade 11 and had three sections K-5, two sections in 5-10, and one section in grade 11. Even with the expansion in sections, Nova continues to have a long waiting list (600+ students), especially in kindergarten through grade 8.







In addition to the licensed teachers listed above, Nova Classical Academy also employed nine Education Assistants and administrative and support personnel (Business Manager, two Assistant Project Managers, Operations manager, college counselor, Lunch coordinator, and two Office Managers). Nova contracted with ISES for additional Special Education services and with Hill Murray for Band.

## **FINANCES**


Nova ended 2012 with an estimated 24.6% fund balance and had set a goal of having at least 20%. Nova had also set a goal of winning the 2012 MN Finance Award as well as having a clean (no findings) external audit: in June 2012 we were alerted that we had been awarded the Finance Award (for the third consecutive year) and Larson Allen issued a clean audit with no findings of any kind in October 2011.

## **ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE**

Nova Classical Academy administers the MCA-II to all students in grades 3-8 to measure math and reading proficiency relative to Minnesota State Academic Standards over time.


Trend in Student Math Proficiency 2006-12 as Measured by MCA-II/III

## ERB data

In addition to the MCAs, Nova tests and benchmarks students in grades 3-8 through the ERB test (Education records Bureau). The test is administered twice per year: once in the autumn and once in the spring. Students test in 7-8 areas and their scores are compared against those of their peers in four groups:

- 1. Nation
- 2. Suburban schools
- 3. Independent schools
- 4. Nova itself

Data is use to track individual student growth and target grade-level program initiatives. A sample report (from Spring 2012) is attached to this Annual report.

## **OPERATIONAL PERFORMANCE**

#### Reporting Requirements

Nova Classical Academy submitted all reporting documents (MARSS, EDRS, Compliance) in a timely manner to MDE. One submission, the newly required, Assurances, went through several drafts and final sign-off did not happen until after the deadline, but the original submission was on time.

#### Legal Issues

A formal complaint (#11-069C) was filed against the Academy on behalf of three students receiving special Education services. The school participated fully in the investigation process. The conclusion was that Nova had not violated FAPE for any of the students, but the inquiry yielded results indicating some areas lacking in Nova's documentation of process. Nova took these findings, updated our TSES manual with the aid of an attorney, and has a more robust process in place.

Throughout the year several issues were raised by Nova constituents to the Authorizer (Friends of Education), either alleging or inquiring about whether Nova has violated process, procedure, or MN law in its operations. Friends of Education investigated the complaints and found each to be based on a misunderstanding of applicable law by the complainants.

The Nova Board worked throughout the Spring and Summer to create a compliance dashboard to be employed moving forwards (2012-13).

## **INNOVATIVE PRACTICES & IMPLEMENTATION**

Charter schools were created to develop innovative educational practices, stabilize them, and pass those learnings on to mainstream schools for improvement. Nova continues in this tradition by building competence in our classical mission. In 2012 this mission was pushed forward in two significant ways:

• Direct Instruction: The Reading program at the School of Grammar (K-5) was revisioned by our Lower School Director to move away from learning through experience

and return to classical roots: direct instruction. The Reading Mastery curriculum was piloted and tested, and will be deployed fully in the K-5 program in 2013.

• Classical Education Certification: This program, created at Nova, trains teachers in the tactics and philosophies behind classical education. This year, in addition to Nova's new teachers (for whom the full-year course is a requirement), teachers from a sister classical school attended the program. The program meets twice per month all year for 2-hour sessions at night.

## **FUTURE PLANS**

#### Academic Goals for 2011-12

1. **Goal:** Increase the percentage of students who "Exceed Standards" in Reading as measured on the MCA-II from 69.6% to 71%.

**Result:** Goal met. Results from the 2012 MCA-II show that 72.5% of Nova students were proficient in Reading.

2. **Goal:** Increase the percentage of students who "Exceed Standards" in Mathematics as measured on the MCA-III from 33.5% to 40%.

**Measure:** Goal not met. Results from the 2012 MCA-III show that 39.8% of Nova students were proficient in Mathematics.

#### Non Academic Goals for 2011-12

1. **Goal:** Secure financial and operational plan in support of Nova's new facility at Victoria Park. **Measure:** Move in to facility in time to start the 2012-13 school year.

**Result:** Goal met. Financial plan present to the Nova Board in February 2012. Nova has combined both campuses and moved into our new facility at Victoria Park in time to begin the 2013 school year.

2. Goal: Develop and implement a revised K-12 Child Find process to help Nova administration and faculty identify early and program for students with special learning needs. Measure: Report to the Board of Directors in June, 2012

**Result:** Goal met. Nova introduced a more robust Child Find Process, RtI, in the 2012 school year at the Lower campus and is deploying it to the full school in 2013.

#### Academic Goals for 2012-13

1. **Goal:** The percentage of all students in grades 3-5 at Nova Classical Academy who are proficient on the Mathematics MCA (all accountability tests) will increase from 78.6% in 2012 to 81.7%.

#### Measure: MCA-III

2. **Goal:** The percentage of all students in grades 3-5 at Nova Classical Academy who are proficient on the Reading MCA (all accountability tests) will increase from 90.6% in 2012 to 92.6%.

#### Measure: MCA-II

3. **Goal:** The percentage of all students in grades 6-8 and 11 at Nova Classical Academy who are proficient on the Mathematics MCA (all accountability tests) will increase from 76.1% in 2012 to 80.0%.

#### Measure: MCA-III

4. **Goal:** The percentage of all students in grades 6-8 and 10 at Nova Classical Academy who are proficient on the Reading MCA (all accountability tests) will increase from 94.5% in 2012 to 95.9%.

Measure: MCA-II

## Non Academic Goals for 2012-13

1. **Goal:** Increase knowledge, awareness, and effectiveness around Nova's Special Education program.

Measure: Parent survey and teacher/staff feedback.

 Goal: Increase student involvement in extracurricular activities. Measure: % of students in grades 6-12 participating in extracurricular programs increases from approximately 32% to 45%.

## Other Future Plans

During 2011-12, Nova was heavily engaged in the building project to construct its K-12 facility in Saint Paul. In order to support the school at its full capacity (900), Nova created a Year One plan which outlined how new lateral entry students in grades 7 & 8 would be supported, how cross-age programming would be implemented, and how long-term budgeting would operate. Without the sustained growth Nova has experienced in the past years, budget management will come to the fore as the vanguard to guard against staff attrition and to create program priorities. These are the operational priorities that will be the focus of Nova's administrative team this year.
