College Readiness, College Admissions and Four-Year High School Course Plan

College admissions requirements vary across all colleges, but they have similar criteria that they like to see in students' high school transcripts upon their application to college. **These criteria include rigor of courses taken, grade point average, and academic electives**. The rigor of the transcript is the most important of these three criteria. In addition, college admissions like to see student commitment to activities, clubs, and athletics, as well as leadership positions. Our college counselor meets with each student to ensure that they are taking steps to applying to colleges that meet their aspirations.

As a high school student, if you have an idea of the types of schools you would like to go to, you can take steps now in your high school course planning. The following chart distinguishes schools by "types" and delineates for you the expectations that are typical or average for the freshmen who are admitted to their colleges.
